Mayor's Message

First, I would like to thank our Public Works Employees, who have worked tirelessly the entire winter, including holidays like Christmas eve, Christmas, New Years & Presidents Day in keeping our streets and parks clear of snow.

Second, the thermometer is rising and spring is upon us. Please stay vigilant in keeping the storm drains clear of debris to avoid any backups during the spring runoff.

With warmer temperatures and a recognition of the havoc that winter took on our roads, we have plans to overlay the following major roads in our city: Main St, Grove Drive, Westfield Road and 100 South. Additional neighborhood roads will also get an overlay as time and manpower permits.

I have also heard some jokingly ask to leave the potholes in place to deter speeding. We do acknowledge this is a legitimate concern throughout our neighborhoods. To that end, our police chief has committed to increase patrol and help with traffic violations in Alpine.

Update on our Poppy preservation project:

- The Poppy Garden will be open this year to the public.
- New fencing has been installed around the Poppy Garden and the Lambert Ruin
- Fallen trees and debris have been removed (Thank you to Alpine 6th and Fort Creek ward youth)
- Pathways are lined with stones (Alpine 6th and Fort Creek ward youth)
- Aggregate will be laid on the walking paths May 3
- Benches will be installed in the poppy garden

If you are there enjoying the poppies please encourage others to stay on the pathways and to NOT pick or remove the poppies.

I love our city and enjoy serving. For anyone else who would like to get more involved, I would encourage you to run for city council. To declare your candidacy and desire to run, applications will be accepted at City Hall June 1-7.



Odd numbered addresses
–Mon, Wed, Fri *

Even numbered addresses
–Tue, Thu, Sat*

Hours to water are
between 7 pm to 7 am.
Odd addresses may begin
watering at 7 pm on
Monday. Even addresses
may begin watering at 7
pm on Tuesday. And so on.

City parks, schools,
churches, and agricultural
users will be on a different
schedule. In order to
balance the use, they may
be watering during the
day.

* You are not obligated to
water 3 times a week.
Some have found better
results watering 2 times a
week for longer periods.


Burn Permits



There are no restrictions this year due to all the moisture we have received. All open burn applications need to be done only through the Utah Division of Air Quality. The fire department no longer requires a local permit to complete the application process. The link below is the best way to access the open burn permit application through the DEQ.


Primetime

NOTICE OF MUNICIPAL ELECTION

Alpine City will hold a General Municipal Election on
November 7, 2023 for the following offices:

Three (3) City Council seats

4-year term

Candidate Filing period begins:

Thursday, June 1, 2023 at 8 am.

Candidate Filing period ends:

Wednesday, June 7, 2023 at 5 pm.

Qualifications for Candidacy are:

- Be a United States Citizen
- Be a registered voter of the municipality
- Be a resident of the municipality or recently annexed area for a period of 12 consecutive months immediately preceding the date of the election.
- Be mentally competent
- Not be convicted of a felony or treason unless the right to hold elective office has been restored.

Declaration of Candidacy forms or Nomination Petitions must be filed in person with the City Recorder at Alpine City Hall, 20 North Main, Alpine, Utah. The week of June 1st -7th, 2023 between the business hours of 8 am and 5 pm. An individual may also file remotely or through a designated agent if the individual is located outside the state during the entire filing period. Code Compliance Corner

Municipal Code 14.08.050 Clean Streets

As spring weather arrives, we are all excited to spruce up our yards. Please be reminded of our City code that does not allow deliveries of any material, including bark, sand, gravel or pallets of stone, placed on City streets in front of your home. Even if it's for only a day or two, this is an illegal action and in violation of Alpine City Code. By doing so, you and your contractor can be fined. This practice could lead to a serious road accident as a driver may not immediately see your pile of material, especially at night. Running their vehicle into it could cause damage to their car and cause severe injury to a driver or its passengers. Broom sweeping may appear adequate when you have relocated the material in your yard, though microscopic residue and silt, especially from sand/gravel, can lead to early deterioration of the roads asphalt surface. Furthermore, in the event your road is scheduled to be seal coated this year, adhesion of the seal coat to the road is marginalized. If a thunderstorm occurs before you finish your project, these materials can end up in our storm drains and accumulate downstream, causing a potential clogging of our storm drain system. This could lead to street flooding elsewhere in the City. If you have scheduled delivery of material for your landscape (bark, sand, gravel, pallets), those must be placed on your own property, (i.e., your driveway) and not in the public street. Thank you for your cooperation and adherence to this feature of our Alpine City Municipal Code.
