Alpine has a long heritage of coming together and serving in the community. We continued this tradition in September on the community day of service. I loved seeing so many of our residents of all ages working together to make things better for our community.

A huge thank you to the organizers of the September Day of Service, Mike and Kim Bradshaw and Bethany Sorensen along with all of the volunteers who came and helped accomplish so many projects - including the following:

- 200 people visited the indoor service fair and an additional 120 volunteers on outdoor projects
- 2 bridges torn down and rebuilt in Lambert Park
- Bridges on Main Street stained
- Bridges on Canyon Crest stained
- Red curbs painted along Main Street
- 13,500 sq. ft. of sod at cemetery expansion
- Bridge painted at Peterson Park

- 3 quilts for LDS Humanitarian Services
- 1000 hygiene kits for Lifting Hands International





Meet at the South Trailhead at 850 N Country Manor Lane, where we will start small groups of riders between 7:00pm and 8:15pm. This event is intended for mountain bikes, not pedestrians. Helmets are required. Please bring a bike light so that you are safe. The course is up High Bench trail, down River trail, which is approximately one mile each way. Only High Bench will be haunted. We recommend that our youngest riders arrive early, so that we can send them right at 7:00pm. Young riders may turn around at Moyle Drive if needed. 
