Code Compliance Corner

Who is allowed to do Door-to-Door solicitation in Alpine and how is this regulated by the City?

Below is a brief summary of our city ordinances that regulate this kind of activity. For complete information see Section 09.10 of the Alpine Municipal Code (MC) or <https://www.alpynecity.org/159/Business-Licenses>.

PERMIT—Unless otherwise exempt, all persons who engage in Door-to-Door Solicitation within Alpine City must submit an application and obtain a permit.

IDENTIFICATION BADGE—All solicitors must have an identification badge that is worn prominently on their person while soliciting in the City. It must contain a recent photograph; the city name; the solicitor’s name; the company name, address and phone number; and the permit expiration date.

"NO SOLICITATION" NOTICE—Any residence may post a “No Solicitation” notice on or near the main entrance door or the property line of the sidewalk leading to the residence. This shall constitute notice to any solicitor that the inhabitant of the residence does not desire to receive and/or does not invite solicitors. It is the responsibility of the solicitor to check a residence for the presence of any such notice.

If you have a concern about the activities of a Door-to-Door Solicitor, please call the Code Compliance Officer at 801-756-6347 x 6. If you suspect suspicious criminal activity or a public safety concern, call the LP Police at 801-794-3970.

Safety Information from our Lone Peak Police Department:

When approaching or using crosswalks, pedestrians and drivers need to follow traffic laws and signals. Drivers should yield the right of way to pedestrians when they are crossing at a crosswalk and pedestrians should use crosswalks when available in order to be more visible to drivers.

Specific rules should be observed by both pedestrians and drivers to make sure crosswalks are safe for everyone.

Here are some common rules for **pedestrians** using crosswalks:

- **Wait for the Walk Signal:** If the crosswalk is equipped with a pedestrian signal, wait for the "walk" signal before crossing. Do not begin crossing if the signal indicates "don't walk" or if the signal is flashing.
- **Look Both Ways:** Even when the pedestrian signal indicates it's safe to cross, it's important to look both ways before stepping into the crosswalk to ensure that all approaching vehicles have come to a stop.
- **Obey Traffic Signals:** If there is a traffic signal at the crosswalk, obey the signal's indications. Cross only when the signal allows it.
- **Use Designated Crosswalks:** Whenever possible, use designated crosswalks to cross the street. Crossing outside of designated areas may be unsafe and is often against traffic regulations.
- **Make Eye Contact:** If possible, make eye contact with drivers before crossing. This can help ensure that they see you and are aware of your intention to cross.
- **Be Visible:** Wear reflective clothing, especially when crossing at night. Make yourself as visible as possible to drivers.
- **Cross in a Straight Line:** Walk directly across the road when in a crosswalk. Avoid diagonal or zigzag crossing, as it can be unpredictable for drivers.

For **drivers** approaching crosswalks:

- **Yield to Pedestrians:** When approaching a crosswalk, drivers must yield the right of way to pedestrians already in the crosswalk.
- **Stop Behind the Crosswalk:** When stopping for a red light or stop sign near a crosswalk, come to a stop behind the crosswalk, allowing room for pedestrians to cross safely.
- **Be Alert for Pedestrians:** Always be vigilant for pedestrians, especially near crosswalks, school zones, and areas with heavy foot traffic.
- **Do Not Pass Stopped Vehicles:** If a vehicle ahead has stopped at a crosswalk to allow pedestrians to cross, do not attempt to pass it.


It is important to remember that drivers and pedestrians each have a part to play in making sure crosswalks are safe! Please stay safe and keep an eye out for pedestrians.

Trail Committee Update:

Happy March! As the weather warms and the sun shines longer, we all want to get back outside. Here are a few Alpine Trail etiquette reminders.

- **Bikers yield to Hikers and Horses •**
- **Hikers yield to Horses •**

The concept is that bikers are potentially fast and could come into conflict if passing other users too quickly. Bikers can stop and go easily; thus, they let other users have the right of way. Horses are big and unpredictable, so ***horses get the right of way.***

What should you do when you encounter a horse:

1) Stop or Slow

If you are hiking, move to the side of the trail remaining within sight of the horse. If you are biking, slow down, stop and move to the side. If a horse is acting up, you may need to get off your bike. This helps the horse recognize that you are a human.

2) Communicate, say "Hello"

This is probably the most important thing you can do. Smile and say hello to the rider. This will calm the horse and also does wonders for relations between all trail users.

3) Ask the rider what you should do.

Sometimes the rider will ask you to continue walking or riding while they wait on the side of the trail. Sometimes they will pass by while you wait. Again, remember that horses have individual personalities and only the horse's owner/rider knows that personality. Trust their judgment.

4) Take EXTRA care if approaching the horse from behind. Horses cannot see directly behind themselves, so approaching from behind can be dangerous to both the equestrian and the hiker or biker. Horses may kick out in what they perceive as self-defense. Again, communication is critical: Gently announce, well in advance, to let the horse and rider know that you are approaching from behind and ask/wait for direction from the rider.
