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A Message from our Mayor

It is hard to believe that it is already summer. This month I thought I would provide an update on a few current issues. First, the following is a timeline of the **School District Interlocal Agreement** and some upcoming dates to mark on your calendar. Please check our website and social media for the most current information.



- **April 29:** The following cities: Alpine, Cedar Hills, Highland, American Fork and Lehi entered into an interlocal agreement to form a new school district
- **April 30:** The interlocal agreement was filed with the county clerk
- **May 7:** The county clerk determined compliance with State Code
- **May to mid-June:** LRB Public Finance Advisors to conduct feasibility study
- **June 18:** Work meeting for presentation of feasibility study and recommendation hosted by Highland (a joint meeting)
- **June 18 – Aug 2:** 45-day public comment period
- **July 9 & 30:** Public hearings on feasibility study and recommendation (separate meetings)
- **Aug 6:** Legislative bodies vote on creation of new school district (separate meetings)
- **Aug 7:** Approval filed with county, if passed

Vandalism: As the school year ends and the temperature rises we have noticed in the city an increase in vandalism in our parks. Please speak with your children about respecting other’s property and especially city property as it will be tax payers’ monies that will pay for the repair work. In just the last week, the city has received reports of “donuts” in the cemetery, graffiti on park equipment and bathrooms, a destroyed rugby goal post in Burgess Park, unapproved ebikes driving on the park grass and wilderness trails, and scooters (or other wheeled vehicles) damaging the pickleball & tennis courts surfaces. This is in just one week! If you see anything, report it. Please, let’s do better!

Code Compliance Corner

If asked what the most common code violation was in Alpine this time of year, it would be the temporary placement of landscape improvement materials (such as bark, soil, rock, etc.), delivered and dumped in a pile on the street in front of a resident’s home.

For the past year, we have been communicating to our residents, contractors, and delivery companies that it is a violation of our city code to place a pile of bark, dirt, or rocks in the street, even if it is only for a short time. These materials need to be placed on the resident’s driveway or elsewhere on their property. During the past year, to increase awareness of this law in our city code, we have physically posted signs on piles in the streets informing people of this code violation, written numerous articles in the monthly Newline, and posted on the city’s social media pages, Facebook and Instagram. Yet, the response we get most frequently when contacting a homeowner of this violation is, “I didn’t know.” Residents need to take the responsibility to inform themselves about our city’s ordinances when improving their property, even if it is only adding bark to their landscape. If you’ve got a question, ask it.

The city will no longer just give warnings for this violation. Recently, our City Council approved **the fine for this violation to be \$500**. This amount is similar to those imposed by Highland City and Cedar Hills. The city’s motivation is not to increase its fine income, but rather to put a stop to the practice of having landscape materials delivered in piles onto public streets. Most people do not realize the potential damage to the roads this material can cause, the unintentional environmental issues created due to silt from the piles entering our storm drains, or the potential life-threatening safety hazard that a pile of material in the street can create. We’ve had multiple cars hit these piles causing serious damages!

It is the homeowner’s responsibility to inform the landscape contractor or the landscape material supplier that all deliveries must be placed on your property, not in a pile on the street in front of the home. The fines for this violation will be assessed directly to the homeowner. So going forward, that load of bark you just purchased for your home, if it is found dumped in the street, may cost you an extra \$500. This part of our code also applies to a dumpster. Dumpsters cannot be placed on the road in front of a residence. Dumpsters must be put in the property owner’s driveway or elsewhere on their property, not in the street.



Doggy Waste Bags

In the last month, over 4,000 pet waste bags were used. While the city encourages the use of the bags, we ask that they are used only for waste collection while in the city parks. The bags should not be used for any other purpose or saved for home use. Thank you.

Glass Recycling Discontinued

Please be aware that due to continued issues with vandalism, the glass recycling containers were removed from the Alpine Elementary School location. At this time, the containers will not be replaced until a solution to the problem is found.


A Note from the Trails Committee:

Watering Schedule for 2023

Please remember, watering is only allowed from 7pm to 7am and on specific days as follows:



- Odd numbered house numbers—Mon, Wed, Fri***
- Even numbered house numbers—Tue, Thu, Sat***

City parks, schools, churches, and agricultural areas are on a different schedule. In order to balance the city-wide water use, they may be watering during the day.

*You do not need to water 3 times a week, only as needed.

Cemetery Plot Pre-sale to Begin:

The long-awaited day is here! The City Council adopted several new cemetery policies at their meeting on May 28. All other previously established cemetery policies remain in effect (see the Cemetery tab at alpinecity.org).

Alpine residents may purchase up to 3 plots per household. A resident is defined as someone who owns or rents property within city limits and who receives a city utility bill.

Due to topography, plots in the north expansion of the cemetery (Sections H, I, J & K) will require FLAT headstones. Please understand this before purchasing, so you do not yell at the cemetery lady. She has tender feelings.

In early June, we will begin contacting residents on the waiting list in the order that they joined. This effort will continue throughout the summer. An information sheet, a map, and a selection form will be sent by email. Those who do not have email may stop by City Hall for a packet after they are notified. Plots are \$1,700 each and need to be paid for with a check.

There are 1,300 spaces available in the expansion, so everyone on the list will be able to purchase plots. Please be patient, as the City Recorder has a plethora of responsibilities in addition to managing this sale. Also, please take your vitamins and get some exercise so you do not need your plots any time soon.


