

# Alpine City FIRE RESTRICTIONS 2024

## Code Compliance Corner

This past month has been abnormally hot and very dry. As a result, the spring green grasses and weeds have turned into dry, highly flammable, straw-like vegetation. Vacant lots interspersed with our residential areas give us particular cause for concern due to the potential fire damage a vacant lot can cause to a neighboring home when if it were to go up in flames. The Alpine Municipal Code is clear regarding the vacant lot owner's responsibility to maintain and cut down weeds growing on their lot, including abatement of vegetation overgrowth that obstructs a public sidewalk. Below is a summary of the Municipal Code requirements regarding weeds:

### 10.06.020 ABATEMENT OF WEEDS AND DELETERIOUS OBJECTS

- **REAL PROPERTY TO BE KEPT CLEAN.** It shall be an infraction for any person owning or occupying real property to allow weeds to grow higher on such property than is permitted by this section or not to remove from any such property any cuttings of such weeds or any refuse, unsightly or deleterious objects.
- **WEEDS - DEFINED.** Weeds shall include any vegetation commonly referred to as a weed, or which shall have been designated a noxious weed by the Utah commissioner of agriculture.
- **STANDARDS OF WEED CONTROL -Weeds constitute a nuisance when they:**
  - Create a fire hazard, a source of contamination, or pollution of the water, air or property, a danger to health, a breeding place or habitation for insects or rodents or other forms of life deleterious to humans or are unsightly or deleterious to humans or are unsightly or deleterious to their surroundings.
  - Weeds shall be declared a fire hazard when growing on a vacant lot within a developed subdivision that has a residential home adjacent to any of its contiguous bordering property lines that exceed eight (8) inches in height.
  - Any overgrowth of vegetation which obstructs a sidewalk restricting the unhampered safe passage of a pedestrian.
  - Obstructs the natural flow of storm water in a gutter and into a storm drain.
  - Any growth of natural vegetation on the parking strip of a setback on vacant or undeveloped of 10 feet shall not be greater than eight (8) inches in height.
  - The cut weeds shall not be left lying on the sidewalk and shall be removed from the premises within 72 hours after cutting.

With the upcoming holidays where fireworks are used to celebrate, we remind you of the City ordinances that restrict the use of fireworks in certain areas. If there is a vacant lot or natural open space on your street or even nearby, please take extra caution when celebrating so your fireworks don't accidentally ignite a lot full of dry and combustible vegetation. If there is any risk at all, it is best to not light your fireworks on your street, even if the attached map shows it to be permissible. **Any loss or damage caused to someone's property resulting from the use of fireworks is the responsibility of the individual setting them off.** Parents, please monitor your children and teach them the correct manner and legal use of fireworks.

Wishing you all a safe and fire-free July. We appreciate everything you do to enhance our community and to keep Alpine looking beautiful.

## Information from the Central School District



The Central School District (CSD) is the temporary name for a potential new school district in northern Utah County. We have worked together with the cities of American Fork, Cedar Hills, Draper, Highland and Lehi to study the financial impacts of a potential new school district, including start-up costs, capital facilities and staffing. We also took an in-depth look at student enrollment growth and revenue projections from federal, state and local sources.

**The study concluded that the creation of a Central School District is a viable opportunity that could provide less of a future property tax burden in these communities if they separated from the Alpine School District (ASD).** The final fiscal impact would ultimately be decided based on the management decisions of the future school board and the economics, demographics, and facility needs.

At over 84,000 students, the Alpine School District is the largest school district in Utah and growing fast. The six cities in the proposed Central School District have come together to provide an opportunity for voters to decide what school district option is best for their children’s future.

Each of the six cities are holding two public hearings on the proposed Central School District. The ones for {insert City name here} will take place {insert dates}. 

## Watering Schedule for 2024

Please remember, watering is only allowed from 7pm to 7am and on specific days as follows:



**Odd numbered house numbers—Mon, Wed, Fri\***  
**Even numbered house numbers—Tue, Thu, Sat\***

City parks, schools, churches, and agricultural areas are on a different schedule. In order to balance the city-wide water use, they may be watering during the day.

\*You do not need to water 3 times a week, only as needed.

## Utah State Fireworks Restrictions:

A person may discharge Class C common state-approved explosives in the state between the hours of 11 a.m. and 11 p.m. **beginning on July 2nd and ending on July 5th**; and **beginning on July 22nd and ending on July 25th** (July 4th and 24th until midnight).

A person can be punished by a fine up to \$1,000 if guilty of discharging a class C common state-approved explosive: (1) outside the legal discharge dates and times or (2) in prohibited areas.

## Dog Waste Clean-up & Bags

**Please clean up after your pets in any public place!**



While the city encourages the use of the bags, we ask that they are used only for waste collection while in the city parks. The bags should not be used for any other purpose or saved for home use. Thank you.

## Glass Recycling Discontinued
