



Main Street Small Area & Gateway Corridor Plan—Open House March 12th

SPREAD THE WORD...ALL ARE INVITED TO ATTEND! Alpine City applied for and was awarded a grant through the Mountainland Association of Governments (MAG) to develop a comprehensive small area plan that addresses land use, transportation, economic development, and housing accessibility. This grant will also fund the update of Alpine's Historic Downtown Gateway Design Guidelines.

This project aims to create a clear vision for the future of Main Street and the gateway corridors, with design guidelines and land-use strategies that reflect community preferences. The plan will provide guidance to city leaders and private property owners about the desired design standards and potential uses for properties. It will also inform city leaders of potential safety aspects when it comes to transportation and economic opportunities for the city. It is important to note that this project is driven by the city's desire to plan proactively—not by developers or builders. This plan serves as a **visioning document** to help guide development. It does not mandate specific actions or impose deadlines for private property owners to develop their land.

An initial Open House was held on November 14th to gather community input and feedback for the project. Based on the information they received, consultants aim to present a draft plan to the Planning Commission and City Council by May 2025. On **March 12th, 5:30pm to 7:30pm**, another **Community Open House** will be held to gather resident feedback on various aspects of the project. Please plan to attend. Your voice is crucial to shaping the vision for Main Street and ensuring the outcomes reflect the community's priorities.

Code Compliance Corner—Don Quigley, Code Compliance Officer

Have you ever considered what would happen if you called 911 in a medical emergency and first responders couldn't locate your home? When every second counts, the last thing you want is for emergency personnel to waste time searching for your house.

Recently, many homes in our city—especially newly constructed ones—have been missing clearly visible address numbers. Some homeowners rely on numbers painted on the curb, but these can become obstructed by parked cars or snow, making them ineffective. Clearly displayed house numbers are not just a convenience for visitors but a necessity for emergency responders.

To ensure emergency services can quickly and easily find your home, we recommend the following:

1. **Number Size:** Address numbers should be at least **4 inches tall** for residential properties.
2. **Placement:** Numbers should be placed in a **highly visible location** on the home.
3. **Avoid Obstructions:** Ensure numbers are **not blocked** by trees, plants, garbage bins, vehicles, or snow accumulation.
4. **Multiple Locations:** It is helpful to place address numbers on **the house, mailbox, and front porch** for added visibility.
5. **Mailbox Limitations:** Your mailbox alone is **not sufficient**, as its placement and the direction of travel may limit visibility.

Many cities have building codes requiring address numbers to meet certain standards. Making sure your house number is clearly visible could save precious time in an emergency and help keep you and your family safe. Take a moment today to check your house numbers and make any necessary updates—it could make all the difference when it matters most!

Cemetery Corner—How Not to Need Your Cemetery Plot – Tip #7

Everyone agrees that exercise in the great outdoors is good for longevity. As the weather improves, we encourage you to take time each day to walk briskly around the city.
