

Alpine City Drinking Water

Alpine City obtains its culinary drinking water from groundwater via high-quality wells and springs. We recognize the value of this vital resource and have developed a comprehensive plan to protect it from contamination. A key part of this plan involves educating residents on how they can help safeguard our groundwater.

To support these efforts, Alpine City will periodically distribute informational materials and requests to encourage best practices in protecting our drinking water. We ask residents to follow these important safeguards:

- **Store chemicals indoors** on shelves above an impervious floor to prevent spills from seeping into the ground.
- **Use chemicals, pesticides, and fertilizers** strictly according to manufacturer directions and dosage recommendations.
- **Dispose of waste through a state-approved business** to ensure safe and legal handling of hazardous materials.
- **Notify the City immediately** if a leak or spill occurs that may enter the stormwater system.

For residents with private septic sewer systems, the City has a public sewer system available in nearly all areas and we strongly encourage connection to the city system when possible. Until then, please follow proper care and maintenance procedures for septic systems as recommended by the EPA. This information is posted on www.alpineut.gov/SepticCare.

Watering Schedule for 2025

Reminder...as in previous years, watering is only allowed during certain times and days as follows:

Odd numbered house numbers—Mon, Wed, Fri *

Even numbered house numbers—Tue, Thu, Sat*

Watering hours are from 7pm to 7am. For example, odd house numbers may begin watering at 7pm on Monday and must be completed by 7am on Tuesday. Even house numbers may begin watering at 7pm on Tuesday and must be completed by 7am on Wednesday, etc.

City parks, schools, churches, and agricultural users will be on a different schedule. In order to balance the use and maintain adequate pressure, they may water during the day.

*You are not obligated to water 3 times a week, only water when needed. Some have found better results watering 2 times a week for longer periods.



Pedestrian Crosswalk Enforcement

During the week of May 12, 2025, the Lone Peak Police Department conducted directed enforcement focused on pedestrian crosswalk safety. Officers targeted three different crossings throughout the community, using the opportunity to educate drivers on the importance of stopping for pedestrians in designated crosswalks.

Over the course of the week, officers made 70 traffic stops related to crosswalk violations. Of those, 61 resulted in warnings, while 9 citations were issued.

The goal of this enforcement effort was not only to address violations but also to **raise awareness** and **promote safer driving habits**. The Lone Peak Police Department reminds all drivers that it is both a legal requirement and a matter of safety to yield to pedestrians who are in a crosswalk.

Additional enforcement efforts are planned in the coming weeks and months to continue promoting pedestrian safety throughout the area. **Please help keep our community safe—always yield to pedestrians in crosswalks.**

Be Aware! Utah E-Bike & E-Scooter Laws

Please familiarize yourself with the laws because they will be enforced this summer!

E-Bikes:

- An individual **under 16 years** of age **MAY NOT** operate a Class 3 e-bike.
- An individual **under 14 years old** **MAY NOT** operate an electric assisted bicycle with the electric motor engaged on any public property, highway, path, or sidewalk unless the individual is under the direct supervision of the individual's parent or guardian.
- An individual **under 8 years old** **MAY NOT** operate an electric assisted bicycle with the electric motor engaged on any public property, highway, path, or sidewalk.

E-Scooters (see Code 41-6a-1115):

- Except as specified in the info below, **a motor assisted scooter is subject to the same provisions as a bicycle.**
- A person under 8 years of age may not operate motor assisted scooter with the motor running on any public property, highway, path, or sidewalk.
- A person may not operate a motor assisted scooter:
 - ⇒ In a public parking structure.
 - ⇒ On public property posted as an area prohibiting bicycles.
 - ⇒ With more persons at one time than the number for which it is designed.
 - ⇒ That has been structurally or mechanically altered from the original manufacturer's design, except for an alteration by, or done at the request of, a person who rents the motor-assisted scooter to lower the maximum speed for the scooter; or
 - ⇒ At a speed greater than 15mph or in violation of Subsection 41-6a-1115.1(3)

Helmet Requirements:

Helmets are required for all riders under 18 years old.

Utah E-Bike Classifications:

- Class 1:** Pedal assist e-bike with max speed of 20mph. The motor provides assistance when the rider is pedaling.
- Class 2:** Throttle assist e-bike with max speed of 20mph. The motor can be engaged without pedaling.
- Class 3:** Pedal assist e-bike with a max speed of 28mph. The motor only provides assistance when the rider is pedaling.


